


2018 ANNUAL REPORTS

INTERIM SENIOR PASTOR

In the opening verses of St. Paul's letter to Philemon, his dear friend and co-worker, we read:

When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. (Philemon 1:4-7)



St. Paul's relationship with Philemon as a co-worker in mission captures my sense of the relationship that we share as pastor and people of St. Mark's Lutheran Church. Ministry with you is a joy.

As many of you are aware, St. Mark's provided a nurturing church home for me during my early years growing up in Asheville. Since that time, I have followed with great interest your growth in grace. It was therefore with eager anticipation of experiencing your ministry first hand that I accepted and your council affirmed Bishop Smith's invitation to serve as your interim senior pastor. For many years your former pastor Chris Webb told me about his love of serving Jesus alongside you. Through my life and ministry with you since Pastor Chris' departure, I have experienced your love and appreciation for his ministry as well.

Not long ago a St. Mark's disciple asked me, "Well, what do you think of us?" I responded with the following descriptors:

Hospitality thrives + Leadership abounds + Vision grows + Worship enriches Community ministry thrives + Racial Healing continues + Generosity abounds

Seven months into our life together I'm pleased to report that I can now link specific examples with each of these characteristics:

- **Hospitality** thrives among St. Mark's disciples. A more formal relationship with our Living Waters, Cherokee companions in Christ is underway. Visitors tell me how warmly they are received upon visiting St. Mark's.
- St. Mark's **leadership**—whether official (council, officers, executive committee, program committees) or more informal—embodies enthusiasm and dedication that ranks far above average. The same goes for St. Mark's excellent staff as well as our seven-member Call Committee.
- **Vision 20/20** provides a compass for our ministry. Bishop Smith led an open meeting with our disciples to explore and sharpen our vision of God's preferred future for St. Mark's.

Regular Sunday morning **worship**, occasional special services linked to church year festivals, and our ecumenical midweek services during Advent as well as World Communion Sunday centers us in Word and Sacrament.

Examples of St. Mark's **community ministry** embrace the poor through regular participation with ABCCM, hosting Asheville's Hunger Walk, providing quilts for Lutheran World Relief, and a multitude of other Christian action offerings. Sharing our building facilities with the community continues with many groups and promises to be expanded with the Loving Neighbors Initiative, providing early childhood education and care for disadvantaged young children. Racial Healing initiatives bless us with a variety of educational and outreach experiences. Healthy **stewardship** of financial resources supports our synod and church wide partners as well our Rooted in Faith building renovations for which we expect to break ground in 2019. Conflict comes in many packages. Healthy congregations like St. Mark's experience conflict as a way of life and discover ways to hold in tension diverse opinions. As we move into 2019, I pray for St. Mark's during this time of transition that will include welcoming the pastor God is preparing to shepherd St. Mark's in its next season. Thank you for making Christ known, and thank you for welcoming me into your community of faith! Pastor Trexler

Building

Exterior renovations, waterproofing, and flat roof repair are finished and the last invoice for \$566,058 has been paid to Western Specialty Contractors. (Contract was for \$ 568,000.)

Interior renovations are in final stages of preparation for completed plans, drawings, and bids. Building team is meeting regularly with architect (John Yurko) to clarify details as they arise.

Finance

Church insurance carrier was changed in 2018 resulting in the same level of coverage, but at a cost of approximately \$1,700 less per year.

Continued to monitor the church's expenses since the approved 2018 budget was in a deficit position of approximately \$30,000. Due to the diligence of each ministry team, as of October, we are showing a small surplus.

Participated in the Ministry Fair.

Performed a detailed review of Designated Funds to clean up inactive funds.

Implemented most 2016 audit recommendations and responded to 2017 audit findings with plans to remedy the findings.

Went "green" by eliminating the printing of mid-year contribution statements. Mid-year statements are now made available my request only. Year-end statements will continue to be printed.

Prepared and presented to Council for approval the 2019 budget.

Long Range Planning

During the past year, 3 new members were added to the Long Range Planning team: Vickie Hauser, Dave Epley, and Shelby Gonzales. Those who continued to serve on Long Range Planning team were Ken Clark, Mark Fritch, and Jenny Simmons. The team continued to track the goals and objectives of the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan. We hosted 2 congregation updates between services. One in May and one in August. The team will host another update within the first quarter of 2019.

Personnel

Personnel Committee provided their guidance and expertise with the following initiatives: creation of Ministry Coordinator position, selection of new Ministry Coordinator, revisions of the Personnel Handbook, and updates to various Position Descriptions. In addition, the Committee continues to provide support to the SMLC staff while a new Sr. Pastor is selected.

Property

Supported to its conclusion, the water intrusion abatement project (including 100 tuck pointing, and moisture barriers under all capstones on all parapet walls. Removed and replaced landscaping plants damaged in the process. Repaired all interior walls damaged by the water intrusion.

Repaired/replaced all things broken. (The list is long.)

Reconfigured robe racks in sacristy.

Supported and set up for all worship services, festival Sundays, healing services, dramas, dinners, the ministry fair and all congregational events.

Ordered/installed ice maker in new kitchen refrigerator.

Installed new TV in youth room.

Re-adjusted pastors' archive wall and prepared additional spaces.

Built shelf units in the Fellowship Hall closets for materials storage from the "Way Back" closet being dedicated to the nursery area.

Updated all First Aid kits.

Repaired floor tiles and re-painted men's room. Other painting as needed.

Straightened/repaired gate to Chiavaras parking lot bent in half by bears.

Added "No Trespassing" signage.

Loaded quilts and kits for LWR.

Installed new grease trap, lines and two clean-outs for kitchen plumbing lines.

Racial Healing

Conducted "Journey away from Racism" faith formation 4 week class that included three sessions with Father Jim Abbott of Christians for a United Community, and viewing and discussion of the film, "Traces of the Trade, a Story from the Deep North". Sessions were well attended.

A joint Celebration was planned and conducted together with WNC BF on June 23. More than twenty parishioners and staff from St. Marks and an equal number from WNC BF attended, as well as more than 60 children. Games, food, bouncy houses, snow cones and incredible fellowship. It was a totally joyful and wonderful experience!

- Eight members of the team participated in a pilgrimage to the National Memorial/Museum of Peace and Justice, at the invitation of First Congregational UCC. At least four different faith communities were represented. The memorial/museum experience was deeply spiritual and emotional, but left visitors with a sense of peace and forgiveness.
- In September held a Unity Service with WNC Baptist Fellowship, then completed a facilitated review of the Unity Service/planning process with the joint planning committees of WNC BF and St. Mark's, with Tyrone Greenlee and Father Jim Abbott. Scheduled next year's event (JUNE 2, 2019) in conjunction with St. Mark's W&M Team and Staff.
- 18 St. Mark's members and 3 guests from First Congregational UCC participated in a Hood Huggers tour of Asheville, to develop a better understanding of local African American history, landmarks, and how we might do a better job together of planning for a future free of racism.

We continue to deepen our relationship with our brothers and sisters from WNC Baptist Fellowship.

YOUTH MINISTRY

St. Mark's Youth Group gathers every other week through the year, usually on Sunday afternoons. This group of 6th-12th graders enjoys time together serving their community, growing in faith, and strengthening relationships with each other and their congregation.



<u>Well Played Board Game Cafe</u> – The Youth Group enjoyed an afternoon of fun at Well Played, a board game café in downtown Asheville. The Youth learned new games and reconnected after time away at Christmas Break. (January)

<u>Souper Bowl of Caring</u> – The Youth Group collected food items and cash donations to support ABCCM's crisis center. For this annual food drive, Youth place bags in the pews, sort, and count donations. (February)

<u>40 Days, 40 Envelopes</u> – The Youth Group raised money to attend the National Youth Gathering by organizing this fund raiser. During Lent, members were encouraged to take an envelope, fill it with the specified dollar amount, and to pray for the Youth preparing for the trip. It was an easy, successful fund raiser. (March)

<u>Youth Show</u> – The Annual Youth Show did not take place in 2018. It was scheduled and the Youth Group was prepared to have the event. However, after Pastor Webb announced that he was taking a new call, the Youth Show was canceled so that a farewell event could happen that day instead. The Youth participated in Pastor Webb's farewell event, instead, and are looking forward to the return of the Youth Show in 2019. (April)

<u>Steam/Park Clean up—</u> Annually, the Youth Group has a picnic lunch at Weaver Park then picks up trash on the grounds and in the small stream. (June)

<u>Senior Send-off</u> – In 2018, St. Mark's had 1 member, Juliet Dixon, graduate from High School. The Youth Group celebrated this graduation, and the St. Mark's quilters made her a beautiful quilt. (June)

ELCA National Youth Gathering-Houston, TX – Four Youth and three adults from St. Mark's attended the ELCA's National Youth Gathering in Houston in 2018. This week long trip included interactive learning, worship, service work, and a lot of hours in a 15 passenger van singing "Deep in the Heart of Texas." It was an incredible faith formation event for youth and adults, and those who attended are already planning for the next Gathering in Minneapolis in 2021. (July)

<u>Game Night</u> – The Youth had a game and dinner night at St. Mark's this year. They were invited to bring a friend to participate with them. As a result, we have two friends who participate regularly in events and are part of the Youth Group at St. Mark's! (September)

<u>Lock-in</u>, <u>Steadfast House meal</u>, <u>and Thanksgiving Baskets</u> — Youth provided a meal to this nearby shelter for women and children. Food is prepared and served to residents. After, Youth enjoyed an evening of fun at our annual lock-in. Also in November, the Youth assembled Thanksgiving Baskets for Claxton families while the played a "Guys Grocery Games" style game at Harris Teeter. (November)

<u>Other activities</u> – Filling and hiding Easter eggs for young children, bowling, mini golf, and the Annual Christmas party.

FAITH FORMATION

Faith Formation Ministry Team at St. Mark's helps to provide opportunities and lead the Congregation in lifelong learning. Through Sunday morning classes for people of all ages, Confirmation Ministry, First Communion, intergenerational events, and Vacation Bible School, there



were many exciting ways for people to learn and grow in faith in 2018.

<u>Children's Faith Formation</u> – Faith Formation classes for children Pre-K-12th grade continued this year. The Pre-K/K and 3rd-5th grade classes continued using Whirl Lectionary based curriculum from Augsburg Fortress. The 1st-2nd grade class continued to use One Room Sunday School (Deep Blue) from Cokesbury. 6th-7th graders used Collaborate: Lutheran Theology and Old Testament from Augsburg Fortress. The high school class used a variety of different materials, focused on discipleship, including videos, articles, and books. Average attendance for Children's Faith Formation during the school year was 30.

<u>Confirmation</u> – Four of St. Mark's 8th graders were confirmed in 2018 – Zachary Hutson, Torin Linton, Nicholas Mueller, and Aaron Neighbors. These four young men attended mid week classes in preparation of their confirmation on Pentecost.

<u>First Communion-</u> Liza Volk, Julia Volk, Lila Niedenthal, Mason Frisella, and Miles Webb celebrated their first Communion in 2018. They class met three times, meeting once at Fired Up! on Wall Street to paint chalices. First Communion was celebrated on Maundy Thursday.

<u>Vacation Bible School-</u> St. Mark's used the Group Publishing Vacation Bible School "Shipwrecked" in 2018. There were about 25 children who attended each evening to learn that no matter what happens in our lives – Jesus Rescues! Children had the opportunity to sing, make crafts, act out bible stories, and play games. There were approximately 20 youth and adult leaders who served in a variety of roles throughout the week, as well as 5 teams who provided dinner each night.

<u>Adult Faith Formation -</u> The Adult Faith Formation Team chose a wonderful variety of classes this year. The classes included: The Church in Society, Short Books of the Bible, The Wired Word, Philippians, A Journey Away from Racism, Nooma, Domestic Violence awareness, The Extraordinary Ordinary (Foundations of the Litugy), Finding Your inner Evangelist, Lutherans in Colonial America, The Bible and Theology, and Mary Had a Baby. Attendance varies by season and classes offered, ranging from 15-75 adults per Sunday participating in an adult class.

CHRISTIAN ACTION TEAM (CAT)

Here's a list of OUTREACH PROJECTS supported through your generosity of time and finances. Additional support came through Thrivent Financial grant programs Choice Dollars (TCD), and \$250 Action Grants (TAG). Some outreach projects were done in conjunction with other teams. Please read their reports as well, for a more complete picture of St. Mark's outreach projects. Also read the Thrivent report for additional details.



- **SOUPER BOWL SUNDAY:** Collected \$350 in cash (including \$250 from Thrivent TAG), and food items (60+ bags) for ABCCM's (Asheville Buncombe Community Christian Ministry) ABCCM pantry.
- **ROOM IN THE INN (RITI):** Two sessions. In cooperation with St Mary's Episcopal Church, The Asheville Ethical Society, Temples BethHaTephila and Beth Israel, we participated with transportation, meals and supervising of a dozen homeless women. (\$100 TCD). Gave hats and scarves made by St. Mark's "Yarn Angels".
- ABCCM STEADFAST HOUSE FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN: Provided dinners on the third Friday of every month. Throughout the year, personal hygiene items, cleaning supplies, snacks, books, underwear, pillows and pillowcases, mattress covers, shampoo, hair conditioner, body wash, bars of soap and other items were collected at St. Mark's for the residents of the shelter. A \$250 TAG was used to purchase gifts for the kids. Gave 40 sets of woolen hats and scarves made by St. Mark's Yarn Angels
- **TOOTHSAVERS:** Collected dental supplies to create dental hygiene kits (toothbrushes, toothpaste, floss) for the ABCCM Medical Dental clinic. Created over 400 kits. (\$250 TAG).
- YOUNG ADULTS IN GLOBAL MISSION (YAGM). Sent \$1000 to the ELCA to support a young person's mission work overseas. Invited a representative of ELCA YAGM to talk to St. Mark's about the program during Sunday School hour.
- **CROP HUNGER WALK**: Helped organize the 2018 Walk for the Asheville area. St. Mark's was the staging point for the Walk. A total of \$19,800 was raised, of that, \$5300 from St. Mark's. 40 of our Church participated. (Two \$250 TAGs; Used \$300 Choice Dollars for two T-shirt sponsorships)
- **LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF:** Made 250 quilts, collected over 75 pounds of bars of soap, and made over 110 school kits (these kits were made by WELCA). (\$250 TAG).
- **ABCCM:** Attended all quarterly representative meetings to be informed on the programs of ABCCM. Sent \$300 for the Fuel fund using a Noisy Bucket Offering. Collected \$650 worth of groceries for the Crisis Ministry pantry with a Food Ingathering. (\$250 TAG) Donated lots of used clothing, and other items to the clothing room of the Crisis Ministry.
- **THRIVENT REPORT:** Please read their separate report for further details on the interaction between this team and Thrivent Financial. Their financial programs made a huge difference in the number of outreach projects we could do!

CHRISTMAS GIVING TREE: Gifts for 3 children of a family participating in the ABCCM Christmas Angel program (value: \$300); \$1400 for the ELCA World Hunger program (animals). 57 English and Spanish Bibles for the ABCCM Prison Ministry. 161 pairs of socks, 8 T's for the ABCCM Veterans Quarters. 20 pants, 23 shirts, 25 underwear, 59 pairs of socks, 94 snacks, 5 lip balm for "Our Voice". (TAG \$250)

OUR VOICE: \$250 TCD contribution.

DISASTER RELIEF PROGRAMS: \$2500 For Indonesia Tsunami (ELCA); \$2500 for NC Hurricane (ELCA); \$1000 for Hurricane Michael (ELCA). \$2000 for victims of California fires.

BLOOD DRIVES (2): Collected 55 pints of blood. (\$250 TAG)

Educated congregation on fund raising opportunities, especially Thrivent Action Grants. Set up computers in the Commons.

Shared with interested outreach members the ELCA Advocacy newsletters, NC Council of Churches newsletters, and other related information. ELCA Advocacy newsletters were also posted on our bulletin board.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY: St. Mark's members helped with the construction of the Interfaith House.

KAIROS PRISON MINISTRY (2 events): Members of our Church participated in successful weekend events at a local prison. St. Mark's members provided the prayers and financial contributions for this event. (TAG \$250) Kairos held a Lunch and Learn to inform the congregation of this program.

PASTOR OF CARING MINISTRIES

From January of 2018 until September I visited shut-ins and those hospitalized or recovering at home as usual. The Lay Ministry Visitors Team was active in seeing that folks who couldn't get to church still got



communion and also a word of prayer and love from their church family. I was available to preach and preside as needed and participated in staff meetings and celebrations. I and Vicar Matt or Pastor Jack offered healing services at noon on the usual Wednesday of each month and then shared lunch afterward with the property crew and guests.

In September, I was out for knee replacement and expected to be away 6 weeks. But a few days after the surgery my femur in that leg broke spontaneously as I turned in bed and so I have been back for additional surgery and out to rehab since then. I hope to begin getting back to work in mid March or so. While away my Lay Ministry Team has kept tending to the flock. Pastor Trexler and others have faithfully taken up any slack my absence left.

This time out has been discouraging, depressing, hope filled, growth producing, weird, and challenging. I have felt the prayers of others upholding me, and the healing power of grace sustaining me. It has been a time to rest and reflect and it goes on. I am in rehab until late March and hope by then to be walking without a walker or a cane, but we shall see.

I am grateful to be a part of the St. Mark's family and a member of the staff and look forward to getting back.

LAY MINISTRY TEAM

BUILDING TEAM

The Building Team is charged with the planning and oversight of two distinct building projects, both of which are part of the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan adopted in 2017 and a major focus of the Capital Campaign later in that same year. The two building projects are:



Exterior wall renovations and parapet redesign/repair to address water intrusion throughout the church

building

Interior renovation to better serve our community and to maximize ministry.

Exterior Renovations

Completed!

Final payment made in November, 2018

Under budget (\$566,600 total; budget was \$568,000). We celebrate all blessings!

Interior Renovations

Progress is sure but steady on the planning for the Interior Renovations. We have plans in hand that have been thoroughly been vetted several times to assure that the needs that we have are being addressed. These plans involve several areas:

New construction in office area to add a second story over nursery/early childhood education classrooms. This area will add two new offices, one of which will be a shared office and will also contain a family restroom.

Two new restrooms adjacent to and actually in the commons, both of which will be handicapped accessible, have changing capabilities for infants and small children, and will each have two stalls. Renovation of the remainder of the office wing to better serve staff, visitors, members, and guests. Renovation of the current nursery and early childhood education classrooms to be able to offer a full-time, accredited childcare program focused on children up to age 4. Our Vision 2020 Strategic Plan includes the need to address generational poverty in our community. After careful study and in conjunction with our Loving Neighbors partners, the greatest need was determined to be among the infants and children younger than 4 years of age.

Renovation of the basement area that leads to the columbarium and the Christian Education classrooms. An adult classroom with technology similar to the library will be added. The small closet that holds both janitorial and property maintenance/building supplies will become strictly janitorial while the property team will have a space for its building/repair supplies and equipment that are used weekly. The community room will become a fellowship space with storage and refreshment capability. This area will be able to serve a variety of folks and needs Sunday and throughout the rest of the week. Renovation and updating of restrooms opposite the columbarium to each include a stall and a shower.

<u>Current progress</u>: We have contracted with John Yurko who is the architect who has been involved in most of the renovation work of the church for the last few projects and who knows this building and its behind-thewall structures and quirks.

Basic utilization plans have been reviewed

Preliminary Code Review with city planning officials, including fire marshal's office, has been conducted assuring that we can address our desired functionality.

Staffs and individuals who will be utilizing and/or who will be affected by the renovations have been consulted for their input.

Preliminary moves have been made in preparation (bell choir practice room; kitchen storage room in nursery has been emptied with contents relocated)

Plans are currently in MEP phase which is a phase that puts us close to being able to send the plans out for bid. M = mechanical (basically heating and cooling); E = Electrical (including coordinating solar energy electricity, phone lines, network needs, hard wiring for security); P = Plumbing (including reactivating current recirculating pump for hot water)

Solar energy panels will be added.

Staff is working on plans for displacement during construction.

Cost estimate review performed; approved by council.

We are getting so close. It is possible <u>if everything goes according to plan</u> that we will be able to have construction completed by the end of 2019. That's a big "if", but we are getting there, and we can hope and pray that such will be the case. In any case, the heaviest and hardest part of the planning is completed.

Please, help me in thanking the many folks who have worked diligently to assure that the plans will meet our current needs and as many future needs as can be foreseen. We started many years ago with assessing needs by the Long Range Planning Team under the leadership of Steve Linton, Carl Schreck, and then Jenny Simmons after the Congregation Study performed by Rev. Doug Johnson and his team. Michelle Kopp, Katherine Laveck and Carl added their expertise and passion to the early childhood care and education portion of this plan. The councils over the last few years have worked hard to sort out the best way to meet all the opportunities, challenges, and needs resulting in a Vision 2020 Strategic Plan and then a Capital Campaign to meet the plan. Eve Kindley recruited an army to help spread the news of both the plan and the campaign to every corner of the congregation. And to all who have served on the Building Team under the leadership of Eric Van Tassel, Steve and Linnea Linton, and myself (Roseanne Doane), I offer a most hearty thank-you. This is a monumental task that at times seemed overwhelming, but with the steady hand of God and of a lot of talented folks, we are getting closer to finishing.

The team continued to track the goals and objectives of the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan. We hosted 2 congregation updates of the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan between services. One on May 6, 2018 and one on August 26, 2018.

EVANGELISM TEAM

The evangelism team met nine times during the year. At each meeting we spent a significant amount of time studying the book "Radical Welcome", subtitled "Embracing God, The Other and the Spirit of Transformation" written by Stephanie Spellers an Episcopal priest. It is described as "a practical theological guide for congregations that want to move beyond mere inclusivity toward becoming a place

"Sponsors are encouraged to continue their intentional relationship with their sponsors for at least the first 12 months of their membership."

We Identified pew neighborhood ministry and introduced it to the congregation. The expectation is that a member of the neighborhood would contact a neighbor who hasn't been seen in a while to make sure everything is ok and if not, offer some assistance.

There were three new member classes conducted during the year after which 26 individuals joined our congregation.

A new online photo directory was developed by the team. Members are encouraged to become familiar with it and to provide a current picture so that the directory is more complete.



LIBRARY COMMITTEE

If you like reading old dusty books with yellowed pages you are out of luck in the church library. This year the committee has withdrawn approximately 150 older books that have lost their appeal. The project will continue into next year, but the shelves will not be barren, thanks to the donation of a large number of new books from Pastor Trexler, Pastors Jack and Linda McHenry, Connie Koiner and others.

THRIVENT CONGREGATIONAL TEAM



The St. Mark's Thrivent Congregational Team (TCT) in Connecting faith & finances for good.® conjunction with the Christian Action Team coordinates the direction of Thrivent Choice funds and encourages and supports Thrivent Action Teams in applying for project grants. In addition the TCT sponsors social and educational activities for members of St. Mark's and the community, and supports the Thrivent Builds Habitat for Humanity program. In 2018 the TCT fulfilled its directives in the following ways:

Thrivent Choice Funds/Social Outreach Programs:

Members directed \$7315 of Thrivent Choice funds to St. Mark's, all of which are designated for social outreach projects. Projects and programs funded included Room in the Inn, CROP Walk, Our Voice Women's Rape Crisis Ministry, disaster relief for the Indonesia Tsunami, NC hurricanes, Hurricane Michael, and the California fires, the youth trip to the National Youth Gathering in Houston, and a donation toward funeral expenses for a WNC Baptist Fellowship family.

Thrivent Action Team grants are available to Thrivent benefit and associate members. Benefit members are eligible to receive \$250 of seed money for any two service projects, educational events, or fund raising activities each year. Associate members may apply for funding for one project per year. Grants were awarded for 23 projects at St. Mark's in 2018 for a total of \$5750 donated to the community, but the impact was far greater in terms of additional donated time, service, and money. A sampling of the grants awarded were for projects that supported Souper Bowl/ABCCM Food pantry, CROP Walk, Steadfast House/Children's gifts, ABCCM Dental Clinic/Toothsavers, ABCCM winter clothes drive, WNC Baptist Partnership Picnic, WNC Baptist Unity Services, Yarn Angels, Ministry Fair, VBS, Homeward Bound, Cancer Care Blankets, and Operation Christmas Child. See the Christian Action Team report for more information on these projects.

Social/Educational Programs:

The Christian Action Team and the TCT set up tables and computers in the church Commons one Sunday morning to help make the congregation and Thrivent members aware of the Thrivent funds available to them. Members were encouraged to sponsor action teams and also to direct Thrivent Choice Dollars available to them to St. Mark's or other eligible charities.

There were no other programs or meetings for members in 2018. Current TCT leadership positions remain: Chair, Dan Dudde; Recorder, Paula Lindsay; Financial Recorder, Walter Hitch; and Project Coordinator, Alice Silver.

Thrivent Builds Habitat for Humanity Program:

While the Thrivent Builds and Thrivent Repairs programs are still taking applications, there were no projects in western North Carolina this year. St. Mark's members did participate in helping to build an Interfaith house.

Many thanks to all members of St. Mark's, whether Thrivent members or not, to the Christian Action team, and to the Thrivent financial representatives for supporting the work of the Thrivent Congregational Team.

TREASURER'S REPORT

I am pleased to report that we ended the year with a surplus \$29,093 in the operating fund. Of that excess \$17,914 will be used to bring the Emergency Maintenance Fund back to the desired \$20,000. That fund had been substantially reduced during the year as the result of extensive kitchen remodel and repair. The remainder of \$11,279 will



be added to the Future Ministries Fund. The following Statement of Income and Expense for the operating fund shows operating costs were well under control. Each major budget category was at or below budget.

The building fund balance increased \$19,451 resulting in a more than comfortable balance that covers over 17 months of loan payments. This is due, in part, to a reduction in required loan payments following renewal of our loan early in the year.

The Statement of Account Balances shows that undesignated operating cash is \$92,295 which covers more than two months of operating expenses. The Statement also shows amounts that are designated for specific purposes other than budgeted items as well as the Endowment Fund balance.

Selected Actions:

Using the newly established formula, the Endowment fund balance for 2014-18 will result in a distribution of \$15,581.95 for the coming year. The new formula calls for a distribution of 5% of the average end of year balance for the last five years (like the prior formula) but eliminates the prior restriction that the distribution could not exceed 80% of the Fund's income from the last year.

The Board worked with Mitzie Schafer from the synod to rewrite the governing documents for the Endowment. Together with the Church's new gift policy, the changes will allow the Board to focus on growing the Endowment Fund and increasing the annual distribution from the Endowment. The old Current Ministries Fund will now be directed by the Church Finance Team.

The Board also worked with Mitzie Schafer on a planned giving initiative for 2019.

Walter Hitch and Mitch Williams were elected as new members of the Board at the annual congregational meeting to replace Florence Rowe and Chuck Baer at the end their terms.

Goals for 2019:

We hope to continue efforts to raise the Endowment's profile with the Congregation through a variety of efforts.

Working with Mitzie Schafer, we will conduct a congregational meeting with follow up planned giving workshops in April and May to encourage planned giving to St. Mark's.

Advisory Actions

According to the St. Mark's bylaws, the Finance Ministry Team shall be responsible for advising on current fiscal affairs as well as long-range financial recommendations. It shall prepare an annual budget for the congregation's consideration. It shall monitor the financial affairs of the congregation, and make recommendations for keeping all obligations of the congregation current.

Risk management and advisory actions the 2017 Finance Team developed or participated in developing included:

Recommended low risk higher return (than our checking account) mutual fund to increase the return on cash in excess of operations and rooted in faith funds.

Effective January 1, 2018, changed Property and Casualty insurance carrier resulting in annual savings of approximately \$1,700.

Installed lock box to improve security of Sunday offerings.

Participated on the Ministry Fair.

Went "green" by eliminating the printing of mid-year contribution statements. Mid-year statements are now made available my request only. Year-end statements will continue to be printed.

Implemented corrective actions for the 2017 audit report findings.

Implemented insurance policies retention policy.

Reviewed designated fund accounts for ongoing need/inactivity

Prepared and presented the 2019 Budget for approval at the Annual Congregation Meeting.
