Dear Ministry Partners,

There was a time when many churches took a breather during the summer. While that reality may still exist in some places, it is not like that this year with the people of St. Mark's!



By the time you read this letter, Becky Sachsenmaier and her host of helpers will have shepherded another successful rummage sale. Thank you for your donations as well as your purchases. This year's proceeds amounting to over \$5,000 will be shared with two ministries: One Youth at a Time and Living Waters Lutheran Church.

Our Call Committee is moving quickly toward identifying a primary candidate. This candidate will be presented to the Church Council. Following council approval, we'll schedule a time for the congregation to meet the candidate prior to a Special Congregation Meeting to vote on an Official Call and Compensation Package. The newly called pastor will then require a month or so in transition prior to officially beginning at St. Mark's. Please continue to pray for our Call Committee as well as the pastor God is preparing to serve in ministry partnership with the people of St. Mark's.

For the past two years, St. Mark's has shared a vicar with Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church. Vicar Matt completes his internship in August and will be teaching at Warren Wilson College in Swannanoa as he continues his journey toward ordination. Sunday August 11th will be his final Sunday with us. Plan now to attend a 9:45am brunch reception to celebrate his ministry here.

A Special Congregation Meeting to vote on our building renovations and financing will be scheduled once our contractor completes pricing. We anticipate receiving this information at the next Building Committee meeting on August 20th. In the meantime, offices, classrooms, and meeting places are being vacated so that construction can begin once congregation approval is given. A display in the Welcome Center highlights the areas where renovation will occur.

Thank you for keeping your Operating Fund and Building Fund tithes and offerings up to date during the summer months. Support for *Rooted in Faith*—the special campaign to support a number of initiatives including building renovations—also continues to be strong. If you did not make a commitment to *Rooted in Faith*, please consider doing so. Any additional offerings for this project will reduce the amount we will eventually need to borrow. And, as always, if you need to change your previous pledge (whether to increase or to decrease) please speak with parish administrator Scottie Miller.

As most of you are aware, I recently returned following a month's recovery from back surgery. While I was out of commission, volunteers and staff kept things operating smoothly. Your support through prayer and a showering of get-well cards buoyed my spirit and hastened my recovery. Thank you for being such caring saints. The surgery was successful and my strength grows daily.

COUNCIL CORNER

We have entered the season of Pentecost, a time of spiritual growth and discipleship. It is also a time of family reunions, picnics, outdoor adventures, and watching gardens grow. Hopefully it is a time for each to refresh and to be steadfast in our relationships with family and friends. We also anxiously await word about the call to a new pastor. The Church Council has conducted some important business at our July meeting. Here are the highlights.



Pastor Trexler has returned after his back surgery. We welcome him and continue to pray for full recovery, and pray for Pastor Linda and other members undergoing surgery and long periods of rehabilitation.

Vacation Bible School is scheduled for July 7-11. Faith Formation Rally Day is August 25.

The annual rummage/bake/plant sale will be held Saturday, July 20, in the Fellowship Hall

- The Worship and Music Committee is looking at a possible date in the Fall when the weather is cooler, to hold our Lutheridge service.
- The Property Committee is tracking where everything is being moved and stored during renovations. The chain link fence running from Merrimon Ave, including the poles and fence supporting the grape vines, is being replaced.
- The Building Committee reports that the contract to install solar panels has been signed, with installation to be coordinated with the upcoming renovations. The committee is meeting with the architect and contractor to formulate the renovation proposal and to prepare a motion to present to Church Council for the congregational meeting.

The Call Committee reports that they are interviewing two pastoral candidates for the second time. Council approved the 2018 Audit Report with no findings.

- The Council reviewed a letter concerning the Loving Neighbors and the minutes of its' April Board meeting. After much discussion, the motion was approved to have Goal #2 of 2020 Strategic Vision (Serve Young Children and Families/Stop Generational Poverty) referred to the Long Range Planning Committee for further implementation.
- Paul Smith resigned from Council due to his moving from the area. The Council elected Kathy Eison to fill his term of office.
- Our Staff, Church Council, the Committees, Teams, volunteers and members of St. Mark's are dedicated to "Making disciples by loving Christ, growing in faith, serving all people".

A WORD FROM OUR CANTOR

Late in May of this year, I attended the national conference of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. This gathering is held every two years in various cities around the country, this year in beautiful (*beautiful*) Portland, Oregon. It included thought-provoking workshops, inspiring keynote speakers, and beautiful worship services. I also got to enjoy time with friends and colleagues old and new. Thank you St. Mark's for helping to make this possible!



Worship at these conferences tends to be elaborate and creative -- huge organs, brass groups, percussionists, handbells, choirs, wind and string ensembles, and more. Yet somehow, it is always clear that everything is there to support the singing of the assembly.

So may it ever be among us. The Lutheran tradition has always had a place for instruments and music of every kind, but always in support of congregational singing. This is just the opposite of our culture's understanding of music -- that is, something for professionals to make and everyone else to listen to. But in our insistence on singing together, we bear witness to a different way. We show that music is not just for those who can play perfectly, read notes, or even sing in tune. Music is the birthright of **every human being**.

Have you ever been told by a loved one that you ought to just mouth the words, because your voice isn't very good? Were you given a solo in elementary school only to flub it at the big moment, and vow never to do that again? Do you love listening to great instrumentalists, but think there's no way you could ever be good enough to play yourself? These messages can easily become lodged in our brains, cutting us off from "one of the most magnificent gifts God has given" (Luther). The good news is that they are not true! "Break forth into joyous song and sing praises!" the psalmist cries. "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly... singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs," adds Paul. Note the lack of the modifiers "if you can carry a tune," "if you made it through junior high band," or "if you can read notes." The clear message of scripture is that every person has a song to sing.

American composer Charles Ives recounts a story about his father, who was asked how he could stand to hear the town stonemason singing off-key, wrong notes, in "...that horrible, raucous voice." His father answered, "He is a supreme musician... watch him closely and reverently, look into his face and hear the music of the ages. Don't pay too much attention to the sounds -- for if you do, you may miss the music."

A MEMBER'S PERSPECTIVE

How do I Evangelize?

Christ & Choice. It has become more and more a theme for me lately. I've been growing more aware of how our



choices lead to defining our character over time. This character represents who we are to the world. It is how we model Christ through who we are. How do my choices moment to moment align with what God wants for me and for us as a collective family of His children? Each day we all wake up and start our day and then go about the day with a choice. Do we seek to bring love and kindness into our relationships with others or do we seek something else? What should be our top priority? What should be more important than anything else, when we make our choice to engage one another?

I would like to focus this writing on a very unique type of relationship, our relationship with ourselves, meaning within our own minds. Each of us finds ourselves within these bodies with these minds that God has so blessed us with. Each of us is tasked with the choice to decide how we use our body and our mind to glorify our Father in Heaven. When given the opportunity throughout the day we have a myriad of thoughts that flow within our minds that may or may not assist us with bringing God's love into this world. How can we develop the ability to choose or to stay focused on what brings love into this world, when we have so many possible distractions from it? When given the choice how we act on these thoughts, in our mind, it seems to come down between two different emotional states, that of love versus fear, and two different responses by us, that of agreeing or either letting go. For example, consider this short story. Let's say we find ourselves in an ice cream store standing in line to buy an ice cream cone. While we're standing there in line we notice that for some reason the person in front of us is ordering the same flavor of ice cream as we were hoping to have. Excitement crosses our mind initially because someone else enjoys our favorite flavor of ice cream.

When it comes our turn, we find out that the ice cream flavor that we were going to order has now run out. Initially, this will often create a thought in our mind that we are now disappointed, but most of us will be able to let that thought go rather quickly and find a way to refocus on choosing another flavor to order. Some of us may even remember that perhaps the flavor of the ice cream is not as important as being happy for the person in front of us, that he or she gets to enjoy such a wonderful flavor of ice cream. Also, we may choose to understand the importance of not sharing our initial disappointment with the clerk on the other side of the booth, but rather share a level of true acceptance and joy in the opportunity to engage one of God's fantastic creations, a human being. Who knows, we might even find a flavor we like better, but if not, at least we were able to remember in that moment that love is more important than our taste buds.
