The origin of this carol is an English mystery play from the 1500s. Mystery plays were an early form of European drama, presenting Biblical stories with song.

Gesu Bambino, arranged by Gary Slechta

Brass Quintet

Pietro Yon was a popular Italian-born organist and composer who spent most of his career in the United States. He wrote this song in 1917.

Infant Holy, Infant Lowly, arranged by Charles Evans

Brass Quintet

This is a traditional Polish Christmas carol, taking its rhythm from the mazurka, a Polish country dance. The words may be found in our hymnal at #276.

Once in Royal David's City, arranged by Lloyd Larson

Brass Quintet

Irish poet Cecil Frances Alexander published this text in 1848 in a collection titled "Hymns for Little Children," the profits of which helped her establish a school for the deaf.

Silent Night, arranged by Wilfred Bob Roberts

Brass Quintet

Yes, the story is true: the organ at St. Nikolaus Church in Oberndorf was broken on Christmas Eve, 1818. Assistant priest Joseph Mohr wrote this next, and gave it to the parish organist, Franz Gruber. Priest, musician, and choir sang it that evening accompanied by guitar, and it has been with us ever since!

Prepare the Royal Highway, arranged by Hal Hopson

Festival Choir

This joyful Scandinavian hymn by Franz Mikael Franzen (1772-1847) would be almost as appropriate for Palm Sunday as it is for Advent and Christmas! The words may be found at #264 in the hymnal.

Manger Carol, arranged by Patrick M. Liebergen

Festival Choir

This arrangement combines two tunes that are traditionally associated with the text "Away in a Manger," the first by William Kirkpatrick and the second by James Murray (sometimes erroneously attributed to Martin Luther).

You may remember this jaunty song from Bible school, or from a 1969 b-side by The Byrds. It is based on the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids in Matthew 25: 1-13.





Gospel Luke 2:1-20

The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. 

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church.




