All Hallows Hymns

*All of us go down to the dust;
Yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia!*



On November 6, 2022 we will celebrate All Saints Sunday, when we remember those who have died in the Lord. The early church commemorated the dead on the anniversary of their deaths (as we continue to do), and eventually a day to celebrate all the departed coalesced around the first day of November. The hymns for such a celebration are many and varied, including the beautiful text above which comes to us from a 9th century Eastern Byzantine Rite. Here are a few more that we will sing on November 6.

For All the Saints

The author of this text, William W. How (1823-1897) was known during his life as "the People's Bishop" for making friends among children and the common people, and not caring how much money he made (ELW Hymnal Companion 242). The tune is by Ralph Vaughn Williams, one of the preeminent English composers of the 20th century, who believed in making music widely available and accessible. While he was an atheist and later a "cheerful agnostic," he took a strong interest in church music, hymn singing, and the beauty of the Authorised Version of the Bible (KJV). In addition to composing grand original melodies such as this, he collected and adapted many folk tunes, some of which are included in our hymnal.

Shall We Gather at the River?

In the summer of 1864, Robert Lowry, pastor of Hanson Place Baptist Church in Brooklyn, NY, was hot and exhausted. He found himself wondering "why hymn writers had said so much about the 'river of death' and so little about the 'pure water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb.' As I mused, the words began to construct themselves. The music came with the hymn." In addition to this beloved text, Lowry wrote 1,040 others (including "My Life Flows On in Endless Song" and "Come We That Love the Lord") and edited collections of Sunday school song books. The tune of this hymn is named for the church Lowry was serving when he wrote it.

Ye Watchers and Ye Holy Ones

Published in 1906, "The English Hymnal" was perhaps the most influential hymnal in (you guessed it) the English language after "Hymns Ancient and Modern." Many of the texts in our hymnal can trace their origins, either original or in translation, to these two Anglican collections. This text was written for the former by John Athelstan Laurie Riley (1858-1945). It is an interesting blending of two ancient prayers, the "Te Deum Laudamus" from the western catholic tradition and the "Axion estin" from the Eastern Orthodox church. The first stanza addresses the nine choirs of angels. The second is addressed to the Virgin Mary; look closely, or you'll miss it like I did for 36 years! The third stanza addresses the faithful departed, and the final urges all of us to join our songs in praise to the Triune God.

"All of us go down to the dust, yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia." At the end our celebration of All Saints Sunday we will repeat that joyful alleluia no less than 26 times as we praise God for the witness of the saints, mourn the deaths of those we love, and look for the day when "there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away." Thanks be to God!

Out of the Blue - Advent Worship Resources

Imagine that you're driving down the highway. You miss your exit. With a little tug in the pit of your stomach, you realize that you're now heading somewhere new.

Imagine that you're at a concert. A piece of music keeps surprising you with fresh chords and new sounds. The composer leads you somewhere you didn't expect, and you can't help but follow, curious to discover what comes next.

Imagine that you've gathered with a group of people for ballroom dancing. The music shifts; it's time to change partners. You're ready to sit this one out, but someone meets your eyes and holds out their hand. The moment is electric. You accept the wordless invitation and spin into motion.

Change is at hand. Something unexpected is happening, and we're in the midst of it.



Out of the blue, something new is arriving like lightning: transformation, wonder, justice, joy. From generation to generation, God has been dreaming of this moment. Inevitably, it catches us by surprise, just like it surprised our ancestors in faith: Sarah, Abraham, Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Mary, Joseph. God's time is now. It's here to reorient our expectations and to sweep us into a future of hope and promise, even if we didn't expect it, even if it wasn't part of our plans.

This November and December, we invite you to join the flow of an Advent season that sweeps us off our feet, carries us forward, and invites us to join God in God's creative work. We'll trace God's plans for justice and peace with the genealogy of Jesus and the witness of the saints who followed him. We'll be surprised by a thicket of new shoots from the stump of Jesse. We'll find God beguiling us by inviting us to imagine something new, regardless of what came before. And if we're worried about the future and afraid of letting go of the familiar outlines of our lives, God will meet us there too.

The highway has always extended past the familiar exit. The music is already written. The dance is underway. But the moment of change seems to come out of the blue, altering our expectations and creating a future we never thought possible.

It's Advent, and change is coming out of the blue. What will God reveal to us this season?

This year we will use Barn Geese Worship's *Out of the Blue* materials for our Ecumenical Midweek Advent Services, Small Groups, and Christmas Pageant.

Joyful Generosity Stories

Recently St. Mark's received a pair of checks from St. Eugene Catholic Parish with "refugees" in the memo line. Pastor Matt called over to inquire so that we could make sure we got the funds to the right place. It turns out that St. Eugene took up a special collection and split all the funds received between the refugee programs of Catholic Charities and Lutheran Services Carolinas. Thanks be to God for this shared ministry of welcoming the stranger and for our sisters and brothers at St. Eugene, partners with us in this ministry!

A St. Mark's member recently reached out to Pastor Matt about donating a car to a refugee family in need, saying:

We have always preferred to give away a useful item rather than sell or trash it. So when it came to the second vehicle sitting in the driveway, which has given us such dependable service over the years, we wanted to share it with an Afghan or Ukrainian family needing transportation through Lutheran Services Carolinas. We have been fortunate enough to receive help when times were tough. It is only fitting to pass on the blessings whenever the opportunity arises. Thanks be to God!

The 2022 St. Mark's Yard Sale was a scaled down affair compared to the yard sales of old, so expectations were modest. Make no mistake- it was still a ton of work for the volunteers (thank you Sachsenmaiers!), but it was at a home instead of at the church, so there was a real limit on how big it could be. Then (of course), the weather did not cooperate the weekend of the event. But despite all the limiting factors, the sale raised more than \$2,000 for the work of the Living Waters Lutheran Mission in Cherokee, the largest NC distributor of free food West of Asheville by volume. Becky and her crew of volunteers were pleasantly surprised. "People just wanted to be generous," she said. "They knew it was for a good cause!"

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus has a lot to say about money. On Sunday September 25th, those present in worship received a \$2 bill with the encouragement to notice a need and use the \$2 to respond with compassion. And many of you responded! We've heard about folks multiplying that \$2 more than 100 times to support relief efforts in Ukraine; \$2 bills going with homemade cookies and a 20 to a distressed family fleeing the path of the hurricane in Florida; LWR baby kit supplies purchased; knitting supplies for Afghan women, adding funds to the \$2 to support flood relief and the Crop Walk; extra sandwiches made to be distributed by ABCCM; support of meals on wheels; and gifts to people on the side of the road in need. Thanks be to God for the generosity that abounds in this place!

Feeling the call to be generous? As we make plans for ministry spending in 2023, it's not too late to let the church office know what you plan to give in support of gospel ministry through St. Mark's in 2023.

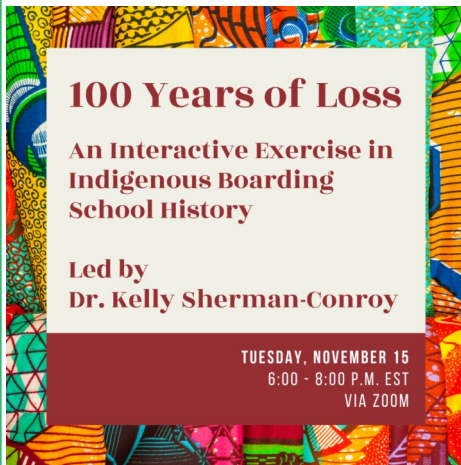
LMM Spouse Christmas Dinner

100 Years of Loss – An Interactive Exercise in Indigenous Boarding School History Led By Dr. Kelly Sherman-Conroy

Tuesday, November 15th from 6pm-8pm



The NC Synod Indigenous Learning Team invites you to participate in an online exercise led by Dr. Kelly Sherman-Conroy on Tuesday, November 15 from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m. EST. This exercise will bring our year of learning the stories of our Indigenous siblings to life in a meaningful way. Participants will explore various meanings of reconciliation, reflect on a powerful experience in a fictional situation in which a community is invaded, changed and the children taken away, and talk about the difference between reconciliation and reparations.

About Our Time Together:

It is our hope that the information and activities within this exercise will give participants the resources they need to examine aspects of the Residential School System and to recognize the impact it has had, and continues to have, on generations of Indigenous Peoples in Canada and the United States. Awareness that the legacies of the residential schools also impact non-Indigenous Peoples is also intended.

Participants will explore: various meanings of reconciliation, experience a fictional situation in which a community is invaded, changed and the children taken away (within small groups), review the meanings of reconciliation first asked and talk about reparations and the difference between the two and create an action plan.

For over a century, beginning in the mid-1800s and continuing into the late 1990s, Indigenous children in Canada and the United States were taken from their homes and communities and were placed in institutions called Residential Schools. These schools were run by religious orders in collaboration with the federal government and were attended by children as young as four years of age. The children were separated from their families, often for years at a time. They were prohibited from speaking their mother tongue or language and practicing their culture and traditions. The vast majority of the over 150,000 children who attended these schools experienced neglect and suffering. The impacts of the sexual, mental and physical abuse, shame, and deprivation endured at these institutions continue to affect generations of survivors, their families, and communities. Many died and were never to return home. Remarkably, in the face of this tremendous adversity, many survivors and their descendants have retained their languages and cultures, and continue to work toward their personal healing and reconciliation.

If you've forgotten your user name, please contact Linda Kinsinger (lkinsinger@mac.com) and she can help you.

Once you're in to the directory, you can add or change any contact information you'd like. You can also add or change your photo. If you have trouble uploading a picture, please let Linda know and she will try to help. The picture doesn't have to be anything formal – a selfie taken with your phone is fine. Don't forget to click on "Update" to save any changes you've made. Note that there's both a family account and an individual member account.

You may have questions about the security of this site. You can find the privacy policy on the sign-in page, at the bottom of the sign-in box. Your information is encrypted and the company does not sell any personal data to third parties. You won't get ads from having an account. You control how much or little information is displayed. As always, it's a good idea to change your password regularly or if you have any concerns about security.

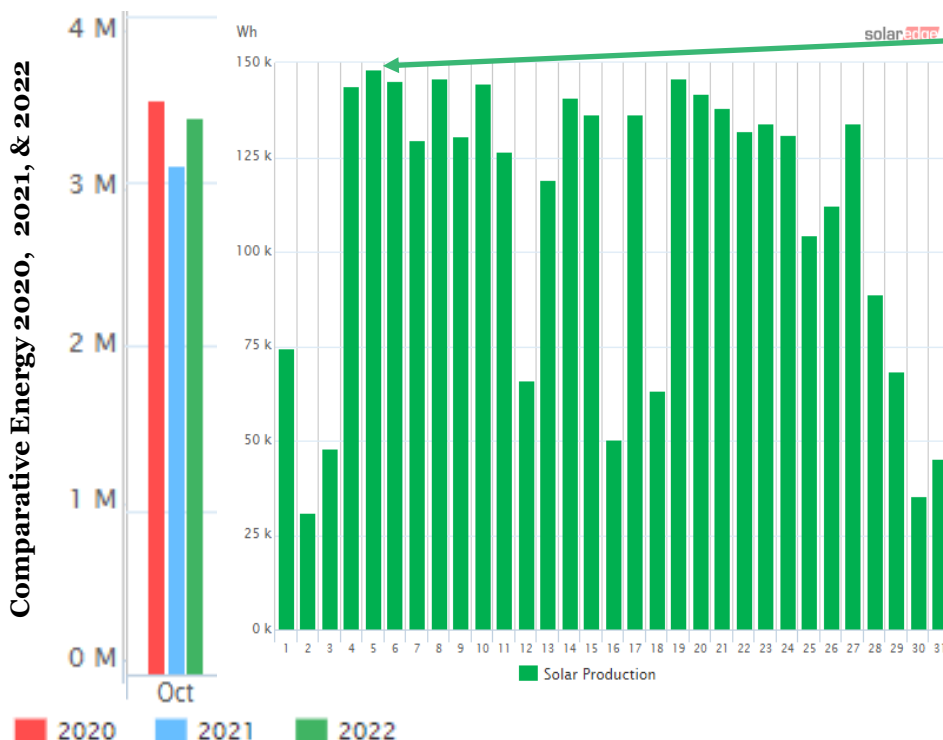
